A Message From Our Rabbi

NEW YEAR, NEW METHODS

Just after I entered rabbinical school, I found out that I needed surgery. I had some decisions to make about my schooling, the Jewish holidays that were upon us, and my care. The decisions weren't hugely consequential in the long term, and I knew that – even at the time. Yet I was stuck and tearful about what to move ahead with, what to put on hold, which surgery and surgeon to choose, and how and where to celebrate the Season. My father, of blessed memory, offered one of the best pieces of advice he ever gave me. “When I am not sure of what to do,” he said, “I always try the thing that I haven't tried before. That way, no matter what happens, I am guaranteed to learn something.”

So that year, I stayed in a relative's empty house instead of joining community and going to shul. I managed my pain, rested, meditated, came to a decision about my treatment, and prepared myself - physically, emotionally, and spiritually - for surgery. It turned out to be a fabulous decision. Departing from a routine I have observed every year of my life before and since, I felt brave. Brave enough to choose a treatment plan that some key people in my life didn't like. Brave enough – and motivated enough – to carve out a few days in silence and



solitude almost every year since.

My father's wisdom reminds me of a few other quotations, which also offer advice on doing things differently:

“The significant problems we have cannot be solved at the same level of thinking with which we created them.”

– Albert Einstein (various wordings attributed)

“Between two evils, I always pick the one I never tried before.”

– Mae West

“Every year on Rosh Hashanah, my goal is to come into the Holidays with a better class of sin.”

– Rabbi Yosef Kanefsky

While these quotations have different levels of seriousness and piety, they all share one essential idea: Life is an adventure in changing yourself and expanding your own horizons, more than it is a journey of external challenges or opportunities.

News flash: “change will require us to do something different.”

For the last few months, I have been taking online classes on how to help people create change. The latest teaches a technique created by B.J. Fogg of Stanford University's Persuasive Tech Lab. He invented “Tiny Habits,” which combines the best of the Japanese process of Kaizen with double-blind studies to measure effectiveness in habit formation. His main thesis is: you have to start *tiny* (not just small); link your new, desired habits to already-engrained habits, and bypass the need for willpower by creating rituals to support the life you want.

Every year for the last seven years, I have taught a single two-hour High Holiday preparation seminar, which has required an entire evening's commitment, plus follow-up, from participants. As we prepare for the 5778, I plan to usher in the New Year in a new way. I will offer a Chai (aka Life) Challenge beginning on Chai Elul, the 18th day of Elul (Friday at sunset on September 7 – sunset at Saturday, September 8 in the English calendar). Each day of the challenge, between September 7 and Rosh Hashanah, I will offer a *tiny* bit of Torah and a suggestion for one *tiny* action or exercise you can try. The Chai Challenge will be delivered electronically, so you can engage it whenever you have a *tiny* opening in your schedule. Read the Shul Shmooz to learn how you can participate.

CANTOR'S CORNER

WELCOME BACK—

It's going to be a very exciting year. Not only do we have 20+ B'nai Mitzvah, but Rabbi Orenstein and I have some interesting ideas for creative services again.



I treasure all the time (ok, most of the time) that I spend here: the joyous and the sad, working with you, your kids, and being up on the Bimah chanting our prayers together.

The prayer that tops the list is one of the most chilling and most stirring of all the prayers that I chant on both Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur: the U'Netaneh Tokef prayer—*Let us proclaim the mighty holiness of this day, for it is awe-inspiring and fearsome.*

The prayer goes on: *The great shofar is sounded and a still soft voice is heard.*

I love to think that even during the quietest, the holiest, and the most moving moments of our services we may hear a voice, a laugh, or a cry which is the soft voice (Ok, sometimes not so soft) of a young child. They're the future – yours and ours, and I love hearing it, but I don't believe that's the soft voice the prayer is speaking about.

The Book of Leviticus starts with the word *Vayikra*, "and [God] called."

The word *Vayikra* as written in the Torah has a tiny last letter, the letter aleph, which has been a source of discussion by scholars throughout the ages.

Some argue that it is because Moses was such a humble man that G-D didn't want to CRY OUT. Some say that G-D should be heard in all the small things in life, not only large, great things.

The Lord tells the prophet Elijah that He, G-D, would not be found in the wind, or the noise of an earthquake, or in the brightness of a burning fire, but rather in

a small voice, in the sound of a whisper.

The first tablets that Moses brought down from Sinai were given with great noise – thunder, lightning, volcanic explosions – and they ended up being smashed to bits. The second set of tablets were given quietly and privately to Moshe, and then from him to all the children of Israel.

In 1 Kings, 19:11-12 it is written—*"And on that day, on Yom Kippur, a great shofar shall be sounded "And the Lord passed by. There was a great and mighty wind, splitting mountains and shattering bricks by the power of the Lord; but the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind—an earthquake; but the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake—fire; but the Lord was not in the fire. After the fire—a soft murmuring voice [still, thin sound]."*

G-d Himself blows the shofar, and He doesn't have to scream in your ears; he speaks in a still small voice.

I continue chanting, 'The angels tremble,' and they proclaim 'Today is Judgment day' –What terrifies the angels? That still, small voice.

G-d calls out to his creatures with a small aleph– so that they see Him in every aspect of life, no matter how small and insignificant it may appear on its surface.

Maybe we're being told to learn by example, to speak in a way that allows people to open their ears, and, by listening, open their hearts as well. I pray that we all (me, most of all) heed that lesson.

So, welcome back, and to paraphrase the opening line of the theme song from the TV series *Welcome Back, Kotter* : **Welcome back, your dreams are your ticket IN...**

The entire Mandel family - Shelly, Stacie, Wayne, Dylan, Ari, Spencer and Rabbi/Cantor Lenny—wish you a sweet, prosperous, joyous and HEALTHFUL New Year.

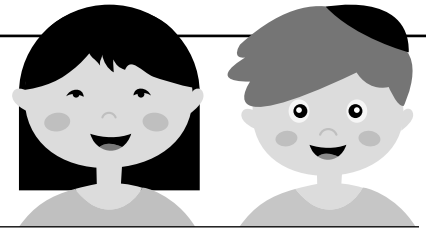

Adult members in good financial standing (paid up to date including 25% of this year's dues by **August 10**) will be receiving High Holiday tickets in the mail by early September. Children of members who are under the age of 25 receive free tickets.

Additional tickets are needed per the following guidelines: Tickets for children of members who have reached their 25th birthday must be purchased for **\$75** per ticket. Tickets for family members of all ages who are not CBI members (parents, grandparents, grandchildren, etc.) must be purchased for **\$75** per ticket. All other outside visitors are **\$250** per ticket.

- A ticket is required regardless if attending one day, or all days, of the Holy days.
- A ticket is the same price regardless if attending one day, or all days, of the Holy days.

No fundraising endeavor would be complete without the "team" who worked tirelessly to reach out to all of our members, and followed through on all the donations. We set our sights high with an ambitious goal of \$300,000, but our minimal objective was to raise enough to pay off the mortgage of \$143,000. I am very pleased to report that we achieved success and raised **\$206,067!** That enabled us to pay off the mortgage and have over \$60,000 in reserve to **PAY IT FORWARD** for special projects as needed.

Passover Project Update

This time of year, we think about spiritual freedom more than physical freedom, but we know that *both* are needed, always.

Freeing Slaves is a year-round mitzvah, and not limited to Passover. The Passover Project therefore functions all year round.

Three years ago, I created "The Passover Project" in partnership with the organization I have endorsed, Free the Slaves. The Passover Project is a loose federation of Jewish schools and synagogues, which all have the goals of a) teaching about slavery from a Jewish perspective b) raising money to help rescue enslaved people and prevent trafficking from taking hold and c) advocating for appropriate government policies.

The very first synagogue to sign on as a Passover Project Partner was CBI. I am so grateful and proud that this synagogue shares my values and supports my passions.

You can see the other Passover Partner organizations, download all the educational and promotional

materials of the Passover Project, and/or make a donation to free slaves at www.FreeTheSlaves.net/Judaism.

In the first year, Passover Project Partners raised \$11,000. The second year, we raised \$24,000. This past year, we raised \$64,000 nation-wide.

Jewish Historical Society of New Jersey

Our newsletters are currently being written by a revolving group of Board members and guest writers drawn from our membership list. We encourage readers who wish to submit prospective future newsletters to do so. Topics can range from neighborhoods, businesses, camps, or community centers and could include family memories or personal experiences you have had in the north Jersey area. Three former Patersonians, who count themselves among the key organizers of Paterson Day FL, Rona Rosenberg Simmons, Beverly Grenker Goldman, and Susan Chlebnikow Rappaport collaborated in the writing of this marvelous July 2017 newsletter.

We were collectively Mulberry 4-1831, Mulberry 4-5560, Sherwood 2-8921 aka as Rona Rosenberg, Susan Chlebnikow, and Beverly Grenker. Over six decades ago, these telephone numbers were our Facebook with party lines, busy signals and operators. This was our Paterson, the Paterson we all left but never left behind.

Who would have thought, three great childhood friends would be reunited as neighbors and friends today in a golf community in Boynton Beach, FL? How could this have happened when I was from Carroll Street, Bev was from the 10th Avenue area, and Susan from the East Side? What bonded us in this very special city of Paterson? The “cement” for us was our progression from Camp Veritans to Brownies to Girl Scouts to Teen Programs at the YM/YWHA and to the Eastside Class of '64.

We came from middle class families where our fathers were MD's -- meat dealers (Paterson Meat Market), mattress dealers (Sleep Mart East Paterson) and menswear dealers (Michael's Clothing on Lower Main) -- businessmen married to their jobs. Our mothers were strong Paterson women, role models who prepared our traditional holiday dinners. All three of our mothers lived long lives into their upper 90's.

So how did the three of us wind up less than a mile apart, playing golf together on Thursdays? The closest we came to golf in Paterson was Hillman's Driving Range, short course, mini golf and ice skating rink all in one. We were too busy finding boyfriends to care about golf. We were too busy hanging around Eastside Park watching the boys cruise around endlessly in their cars on a Sunday afternoon. We were too busy shopping at Junior Cottage (Fairlawn Avenue), Geri's (Broadway), or Jacob's 29, where Bev and I bought our chubby sizes, Quackenbush, Meyer Brothers and The Mart.

We were going downtown, dashing into Hamburger Express (choo choo train and all) and Nedick's before our buses arrived.

The three of us have the fondest memories at the 'Y' swimming pool. When collaborating on this article, we were hysterical reminiscing about what we saw through a keyhole in the girls' locker room. Girls' bathing suits were basically over-size woolly undershirts that drooped so low, we needed to tie them in the back with a string to prevent them from falling down. The boys swam naked (why?) and the old ladies sat nude on benches drying themselves meticulously here, there, and everywhere.

Thursday night was record and dance night at the 'Y' plus Tween Trails and Clubs--our home away from home. When we weren't at the 'Y', we were sitting on someone's "stoop" playing or watching stickball, stoopball, Double Dutch and Chinese jump rope. We all knew the milkman, the seltzer man and the names of every car we counted. We knew where to find our favorite ball at Bowl-O-Mat and Market Lanes. It was a simple life. We were latchkey kids, enjoying TV dinners, hot dogs and Hanna Krause. The smell of the Wonder Bread factory continues to be a delightful and delicious memory. Our Girl Scout tour of the factory ended with a reward of a

freshly baked mini loaf.

We experienced many bar-mitzvahs, and not so many bat-mitzvahs. After all, we were girls... Nevertheless, we have upheld our Jewish traditions and sixty years later are still celebrating these Jewish holidays together.

Having a happy childhood in Paterson brought the three of us together. We are keeping these life changing memories and traditions alive by seeking out our old Paterson friends at luncheons, dinners, parties and golf. Thank you, Facebook. What a wonderful invention!

In the 1950's a car pulling a massive A-frame sign would ride up and down the streets of Paterson advertising "Land for Sale in Florida. \$1 an Acre." We heard our parents say "It's a scam. It's under water." If we only knew then what we know now. Three good friends are probably playing golf on that swamp land in Florida right now!
